

Emerging Frontiers: The shift towards AI driven Entrepreneurship

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The rapid shift towards Artificial Intelligence integration into the Higher Education space has forced the adoption of critical paradigms within the entrepreneurial frameworks of the sector. The rivers of gold once represented by large international student cohorts has begun to shift as sentiments towards immigration and such cohorts has begun to shift as populist parties appear to have captured the zeitgeist. AI Techno-populists such as Elon Musk, Sam Altman, and Peter Thiel all hold varying degrees of optimism and pessimism within the AI implementation framework. The truth and mythos of how these technologies will play out are still very much in the balance. Higher Education institutions are seeking to counter this revolution through the adoption of AI driven entrepreneurship. The entrepreneurial focus that is beginning to emerge within the sector is driven as a means towards student learning outcomes. A student commencing a higher education degree today will graduate into a very different economic and logistical framework compared to just five years ago.

The sector and the challenges faced by AI entrepreneurship can be viewed as either catastrophe or as an opportunity to harness tools for productivity and wealth creation. The early days of the framework debate appear to show a real opportunity to harness the tools of AI to implement radical productivity and wealth creation. There will be winners and losers in this emerging fourth industrial revolution scenario. The real impact of this will be in how the tools are harnessed for the good of humanity to improve work-life outcomes as opposed to purely pursuing greed and an innate human desire towards selfishness. The next few years will be crucial in mapping the emerging landscape.

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
