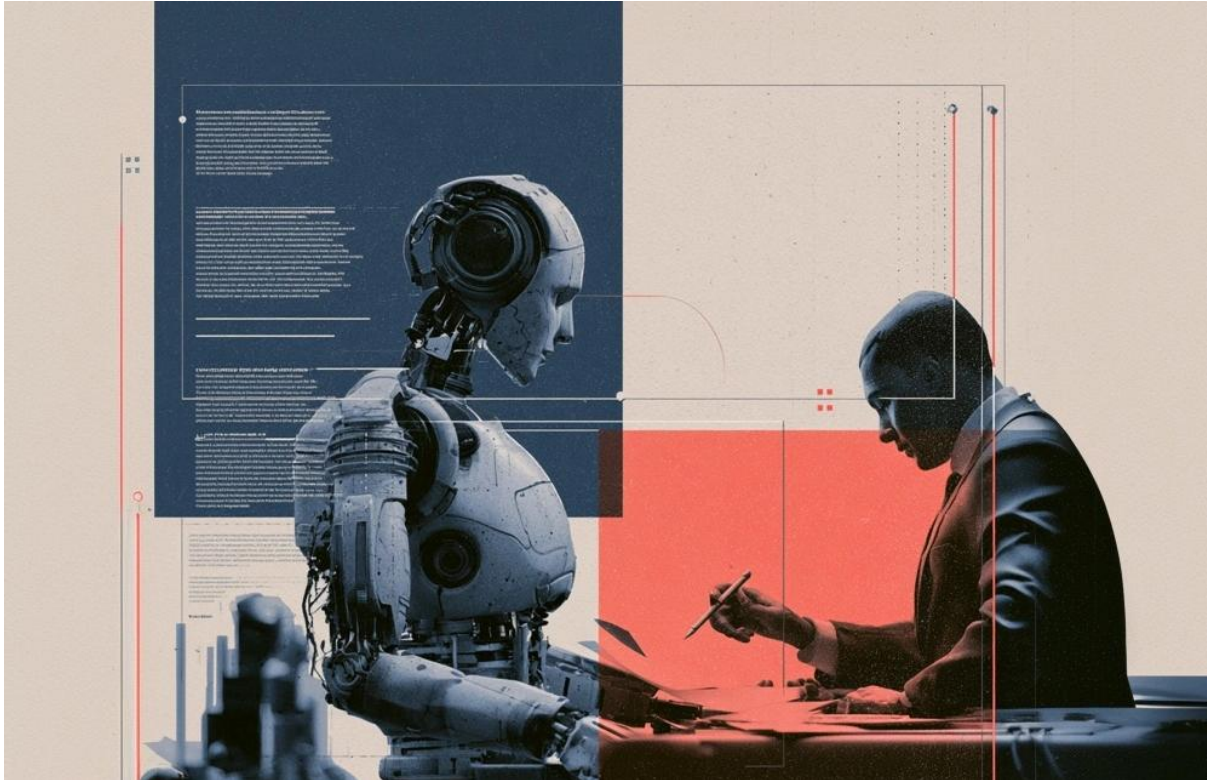


AI Policy Development: Navigating the Future of Responsible AI
