

Why an MBA qualification is valuable

Further, through devised majors/specialisations – this skill set can be further extended to enhance the current set of skills taking candidates to a heightened level.

Earning Potential

Statistically, MBA graduates tend to earn higher salaries compared to those with only undergraduate degrees. The qualification can provide a significant return on investment, as it equips graduates with the skills and credentials to negotiate better compensation packages and secure more lucrative positions. The particular focus of an MBA also provides a pathway into senior management opportunities – with enhanced earning potential.

In addition to these three vitally important potentials – there are several other advantages in doing an MBA including networking (benchmarking) opportunities; developing entrepreneurial insights; and the fact that the award is globally accepted and acknowledged.
